7:30 - 8:15 a.m.	Accelerating Diuresis and GDMT of CHF Patients (Strong-HF & Rapid Diuresis) in a Scalable Manner Fred Amell, MD Slow inpatient diuresis is associated with avoidable morbidity/mortality, high LOS, and costs. Often patients are discharged in hypervolemic states and a small minority are titrated to GDMT within two weeks of discharge contributing to readmission. Many rapid diuresis programs are limited by reliable volume indicators and GDMT uptake programs. This contributes to worse outcomes and extended patient stays. This discussion will be on scalable solutions to overcome these barriers by safely accelerating diuresis and GDMT of CHF patients.

It delves into the strategies, tools, and resources employed to enhance patient safety, clinical outcomes, and patient satisfaction. The talk underscores the importance of data-driven methods and problem-solving mechanisms in fostering a culture of continuous improvement and excellence in the era of value-based care.

6:15 - 7:00 p.m.	Parenteral Opioids for Pain in the Hospital: A Rational Approach to a New Standard of Practice Adam Ackerman, MD Dr. Ackerman will discuss inpatient opioid prescribing practices, with a review of typically used parenteral opioids, particular challenges to opioid prescribing for inpatients, and moving toward a new inpatient opioid standard of practice favoring the utilization of the oral and subcutaneous routes of administration.

Lucas, MD Hospitalists need to interpret lots of clinical measurements to make informed decisions: Has the white blood cell count increased? Is the weight dropping? An understanding of imprecision is essential when 'trending' clinical measurements because naturally occurring variability is unavoidable. This lecture will discuss the nature of measurement errors and will offer a practical guide to estimate if changes between serial measurements reflect true changes or mere fluctuations based on analytical or biological variation.
